

Claims he tried to kill himself. but couldn't

Neil Entwistle told po-lice that he returned home after running an errand to find his wife and infant daughter dead from gunshot wounds, then tried to kill himself with a knife but couldn't go through with it, police said in a court affidavit.

Entwistle, who is charged with murder for the deaths of Rachel Entwistle, 27, and their 9-month-old daughter Lillian, apparently detailed his



version of events to Hop-

version of events to Hop-kinton police during a Jan. 23 phone call from his pare-ents' home in Worksop, England.
Entwistle allegedly told police during the conversa-tion that his wife and daughter were in bed when he left the family's retract home in Hopkinton at about 9 a.m. on Jan. 20. He said he returned two hours later to find them shot to death, according to the af-fidavit unseade Friday in Framingham District Court.

"He said he did not call for emergency assistance, but instead covered them up and got a knife to kill himself, but could not go through with it," Hopkin-ton police Sgt. Joseph Ben-nett wrote.

Birth and death records already point to a link between the two men but the cheek swab, says Woodworth's wife

Scores of genealogy sleuths like those descended from Woodworth are using DNA testing to find out if they not only share a surname, but a Y-chromosome, too. At least a dozen companies sell DNA kits designed to help families move beyond the paper trail to discover new branches of their family tree.

"We spend years searching for proof

of our lineage, but paper proof can be wrong," said Sherrye Woodworth, who has spearheaded a Woodworth family DNA project. "DNA information will show if our paper information is correct.
